Selecting MFL & Options

New Process for Selecting Options

- Students will complete their Entrance Assessments by 27th January
- The results will be published and posted to all parents in Early February.
 - The Report will show a student's Performance in:
 - Verbal

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- Quantitative
- Non-Verbal
- Spatial

Observations (CAT 4)

• This is a balanced profile, demonstrating verbal and spatial abilities in the average to high average range.

• Student's Name is likely to be secure in most areas of learning including writing, discussions, paired work and creative tasks, as well as in visualisation and working with pictures, diagrams, 3D objects, mind maps and other tangible methods of learning.

• Student's Name is likely to enjoy active learning methods such as modelling, demonstrating and simulations and engaging with written material. She is likely to respond equally to a variety of teaching and learning methods.

• Student's Name should do relatively well in both languagebased subjects and subjects such as science, technology, design and geography which will draw on her spatial ability.

Implications for teaching and learning

• Student's Name has no particular preference and a high level of developed abilities.

• Expectations need to be appropriately high with enrichment activities to provide challenge and extension.

• While teachers should continue to use a broad and varied range of styles, it is likely that **Student's Name** will be a self-motivated and independent learner.

• Teachers should encourage **Student's Name** to follow her interests. She will benefit from a fast pace of instruction, tend to learn very quickly and respond well to tasks that develop her independent study skills.

• Extension activities that require **Student's** Name to form hypotheses, make predictions and test outcomes may be particularly helpful.

• Q&A sessions should be used to develop higher order thinking skills by requiring **Student's Name** to justify opinions.

• Student's Name may benefit from opportunities to teach/coach others.

• Student's Name should be encouraged to read extensively and choose from a wide range of material.

• Student's Name may enjoy creative writing, discussion and debate and should be encouraged to develop such interests both in lessons and through extra-curricular activities.






Free Book Scheme 2024 March 2024

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- Minister for Education Norma Foley has today (Wednesday 22 March) announced details of a groundbreaking new scheme which provides free schoolbooks in primary schools and special schools.
- More than 558,000 pupils enrolled in approximately primary schools, including over 130 special schools, will benefit from the new scheme.
- This initiative will provide not only free schoolbooks, but workbooks and copybooks, easing the financial burdens families during back-to-school time.
- This funding will also provide schools with an Support Grant to assist with the roll out and of the scheme and to relieve the administrative burden on schools.
